# **Celebration and Achievements Policy**

### **Policy Statement**

#### **Key Principles**

#### 1. Inclusivity

- Every student has unique strengths and talents; our celebration approach is inclusive, valuing achievements across academic, social, and personal growth areas.

#### 2. Positive Reinforcement
